

From the Editor...

the evolution of the MGOC Pique Nique

Picnics are as traditional as traditions come. The idea of a meal eaten outdoors, in the open air (al fresco), in a scenic landscape, such as a park or beside the road (see page 14), with an interesting view, with either family members, that special "someone", or friends, and typically, in the summer, probably dates as far back to our need to eat. In fact, romanticized notions of middle age picnics, typically invoked a meal during a "hunt" or a sporting event. (see page 23)

The first usage in print of the word "pique-nique" traces back to a 1692 edition of Tony Willis' French work, *Origins de la Langue Francaise*, when it was used to describe a group, dining in a restaurant, but having brought their own wine. The word "picnie" first appeared in the English literature in a letter from Lord Chesterfield in 1748, who described a meal with associated card-playing, drinking, and conversation. Clearly, the precursor to our "Natter & Noggin'," but outdoors, as opposed to Nation's Giant Hamburgers (see page 23).

But the English did not stop there. The seemingly evolution of "picnic," has come to connote a shared meal to which everyone contributes something. A sort of modern day "pot luck," but outdoors, and a thin piece of linen, representing your table / chair / side table combination. (see page 14) In time, the English introduced wicker baskets, as the "carry-all," for all things related to this outdoor dining experience. And when horses became passe', MG of Abingdon, added the option of a "picnic / luggage rack," to their ever popular classic T-series. (see page 10) In time, fine china, polished silverware utensils, crystal wine

(see page 19) Before long, even sitting on the ground in the sweltering sun also became too common and lowly, prompting the introduction of the folding chair and "sunbrella." (see page 5)

Although the MGOC began in 1957, the ultimate marriage of the club and an annual picnic did not begin until the '70s. But things didn't really rock, until the introduction of "door prizes" in the '90s.

Taking the Backroads to GOF West 2016

traversing the beautiful highways and byways of the Northwest

I got up early, on the 25th of June, in anticipation of a long drive to Redmond, Oregon, to attend GOF West 2016. My 1976 MGB was packed the night prior, so I loaded up on some coffee, fired up the MG, and headed north from Lake Tahoe. I got on CA-89 going north to explore the back roads of Northern California. My goal that day was to transit through Lassen National Park, which is about 190 miles from Tahoe. That mission was accomplished by lunchtime where I stopped at the south Visitor's Center for some useful information and a bite to eat.

Continuing on CA-89 which winds through the park I was amazed at the amount of snow still on the ground. Visitors were riding down the hills on anything they could find and could care less that it was the last weekend in June.

After transiting the Park, I headed northeast on CA-299, then on to CA-136 to Klamath Fall, where I had planned to spend the night. After a good night's rest I

continued north on OR-97, and in about 30 miles, I veered off to the west to enter Carter Lake National Park from the southern entrance. After transiting the southern entrance, I continued up the lodge which sits adjacent to the rim of the lake (or crater). I parked the MG right out front and went into the lodge to a cup a coffee with my Nikon strung on my shoulder. I enjoyed the coffee and took a number of photographs of the lake and with the Cascades reflecting in the distance.

I fired up the MG and head north to exit the park with a short stop for some final photographs looking south with my MG in the foreground and Crater Lake in the background. After about an hour, I reconnected with OR-97 and again headed north. It was about 130 miles from the cut off from Crater Lake to Bend, OR and then another 20 miles, or so, to the Eagle Crest Resort, where GOF West 2016 would be held.

In the early afternoon, I checked in to the resort and unpacked my MG. The folks planning this event have to be given credit for picking a perfect venue. The resort had ample parking space for all of our MGs; a nice convention center for meeting and dinner meals; ample space for trailers and RV parking; a nice swimming pool; and championship golf course. The staff at the resort were most friendly and helpful with all our needs. There were some nice eateries within walking distance so there was no need to fire up the MG to head to Redmond or Bend for a meal.

On Monday I got up and headed to Redmond to wash the bugs and dirt off my MG from the +500 mile trip. I found a coin operated car wash and took my time cleaning the MG inside and out to get ready for the car show.

On Tuesday I moved the MG to the main parking area for the static car show and found a nice spot, under some pine trees, that were casting shadows onto the parking lot, which kept me cool, under the northwest sun. There were approximately 80 MGs in attendance and we were divided up into MG subgroups. There were TDs, TFs, TCs, vintages.

variants, and post 1955 models. We would keep these grouping throughout the week for the Funkhana and Rally event to be held later in the week.

The static car show began at 9am and lasted until noon. After the car show, we were on our own and I took advantage and explored the area



On Wednesday morning the parking lot was set up for the Funkhana event. I grabbed my camera and took pictures as a TD made its way through all the obstacles. The theme of the Funkhana was the "Oregon Trail" and drivers and navigators were cowboy hats or bonnets as they progress through the obstacle course. It was fortunate that I captured a TD as it passed through all the stations along the way, because I knew what to expect when it became time for me to enter the course. I befriended an attendee by the name of Barry Engstrum who trailered his TD from Salt Lake City, Utah. Unfortunately, he was having mechanical issues so he volunteered to be my navigator for the Funkhana. In between taking pictures of folks transiting the Funkhana, I headed back to my room and grabbed my Mandolin, and put in the trunk of my MG. It would become quite useful for the last event of the Funkhana. While waiting my turn to go through the Funkhana I visited the flea market table which was setup adjacent to the Funkhana. I was very fortunate the flea market was going on because my gear shift knob broke and I was lucky enough to find a spare for sale at one the tables. At about 11am, I entered the first event of the Funkhana, and finished about 30 minutes later.

There were events that tested parking skills, steering, turning, puzzle solving, quizzes, and singing. The final event was singing a camp fire song and when it was our turn I got out my trusty mandolin from the trunk and accompanied Barry on a couple



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of verses of Oh-Susana. Folks watching seemed to liked our rendition as we got a nice round of applause when we were done. Again in the afternoon we had free to explore the area of just take a nap (which I did).

Thursday was the rally, which began and ended at the convention center. The rally consisted of a scavenger hunt as well as 4 checkpoints. I stopped at a Wells Fargo and bought a roll of quarters to search through for the Oregon State Quarter and Barry visited some local antique dealer and found an Eisenhower silver dollar.

We headed back to Eagle Crest Resort and finished the Rally, in the nick of time, at 1pm. We had one final quiz sheet to fill out and once that was

done, we were finished with the Rally. Once again, we were on our own, for the rest of the afternoon. It just so happens that the factory, which made my mandolin, was in Bend, so I decided to head down to to see if I could get a tour. Unfortunately, they don't give tours but they have a nice show room with instruments, ranging from a hundred dollars, to ten of thousands dollars. I spent my time fooling around on an octave mandolin. When I ask the sales lady the price, she said she had to check so I continue to play. She returned and informed me it was only \$9,500 and I immediately put the instrument away for fear of damaging

In the evening the awards banquet was held and a number of the members from the MG Owners club won awards. George Steneberg/ Marcia Crawford won their class for his 1933 MG J2. Randy Grossman and Eric Baker won with their MGA in the Post 55 class. In the same class, Andy and Maria Preston came

in second with their 1967 MGB/GT. Then it was onto the Funkhana and Rally awards. Again we competed in our vehicle classes and I came in second (as the driver) in the Post 55 class in the Funkhana (it must have been my mandolin playing that put us over the top).

I also won second in the Post '55 class in the Rally (as the driver) and I am sure the stop to find an Oregon State quarter and a silver dollar paid off. The NORCAL MGOC were all sitting at the same table and as the presentation concluded, we congratulated one another and headed off to bed to get ready for the trip long ahead.

On Friday, I got up early, grabbed some coffee, and began to pack my MG. I departed Redmond at about 10:30am, heading down OR-97 and arrived in Klamath Falls in the early afternoon. I got some lunch and checked into the hotel and rested up for the next day's drive back to Lake Tahoe.

I departed Klamath Falls around 8am on Saturday and again stayed on OR-97, CA-136, and CA-89 going south. The weather was very nice, but bordered on hot. Just as I crossed the Oregon/California border I hit a bump and my gas gauge, tachometer, fuel gauge, and turn signals all stopped working. I suspected a blown fuse and I was correct. I had a couple of spares and put them in my fuse box but they blew as well. I figured once I got home I would sort things out. My speedometer and odometer still worked and I knew what my fuel mileage was, so I knew I could get home without any trouble.

So I ended up with one minor mishap on my journey which I think was pretty good for a 40 year old MG. I arrived home around 4pm after driving around 1,000 miles I am proud to say I had not driven a single mile on an interstate. Truly a wonderful road trip traversing the beautiful highways and byways of the northwest.
