

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

Well it's nice to see the sun again after almost one month of rain which has given me a chance to get the GT back on the road and see if I fixed anything, but more about that later on.

The website for GT-42 went live in January and we have already had over 45 registrations for the event that we are co-hosting with the Paradise car club from June 19-23 in Solvang. If you're thinking about attending I urge you to sign up now because the hotel rooms are selling out fast. Our host hotel is the Hotel Corque in the middle of Solvang. We've had sign ups from all over the country and there are caravans planned from the East coast along Route 66 and from British Columbia. We even have people flying in from the UK and from the land of OZ, down under.

We have 3 events happening in March so let's hope the weather co-operates. We have the club breakfast meeting on the first Saturday of the month at Nations in El Cerrito and remember the person who drives the furthest in an MG gets a free breakfast. On March 11th we have the tech session at Craig Kunzinger's garage on "getting you car ready for the season" and on Friday March 17th, we have the St. Paddy's Day tour, lead by yours truly and Marla. Back into my garage and the stumbling problem I have with the GT. I've swapped out everything on the ignition side and finally thought I'd found the problem when I replaced the "red rotor" with an old fashioned brown Bakelite one. My elation was short lived when after 9 miles the engine coughed and stumbled and I struggled home. The problem now seems to be more stumbling as opposed to cutting out.

My focus has now changed to the fuel side. I removed the carbs and stripped them down and they were spotless, but I reset the floats, synchronized them and fine tuned the mixture. I reset the timing to 34° BTDC at 3500 rpm. The car starts easily, idles nicely but still stumbles when warm and it seems like fuel starvation. I drained the fuel tank but the fuel was clear and no signs of water but I put fresh fuel in the tank. I replaced the fuel pump but the new one was faulty and didn't pump fuel so I re-installed my old pump which works but the engine still stumbles. I'm now waiting for my replacement pump to arrive to see if that is the problem. I've just had another thought could it be a faulty gulp valve? We'll see.



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

Getting your LBC ready for the driving season



The Flat Cap

With the longer and more intense winter we have had this year, I have worn a cap nearly every day. Due to my waving hair (waved "goodbye"), a cold head makes my nose run. I am like my father in that. But he claims he is just backwards, "My nose runs and my feet smell."

When folks at work teased me about wearing these caps, I became curious about the origin and history of this type headgear. They are popular for use in open sports cars, of course. The flat cap is a simple joining of cloth with short sides and a short stiff brim in front. They are made of wool, tweed, cotton and even leather, and are usually lined for comfort.

Wikopedia claims the style dates to the 14th century in England and Italy. In 1571, an Act of Parliament required that males over 6 year of age must wear wool head cover on Sundays and holidays. This was intended to stimulate wool consumption and trade. Nobility and "persons of degree" were exempted. The act was enforced with a fine of 3 farthings. The bill was repealed in 1597 but by then the practice was firmly established.

The caps were and are called by many names, golf caps, driving caps, cab driver or cabbie hats, newsboy or newsie caps, cheese-cutters (New Zealand), dunchers (Ireland) or 'bunnets' (Scotland) derived from its original name of bonnet in England. The tudor bonnet used in academic dress came from this cap. Greek fisherman's caps are rather similar but with a high front and the style varies a bit. My sister got me one recently from Christys London, completely hand made in Italy.

Flat caps were commonly worn throughout Britain and Ireland in the 19th and 20th centuries. Immigrants brought them to the United States where they became common by 1890 and remained standard wear for boys until the 1930s, usually with knickers. Finer cloth versions were accepted for casual use by the upper crust, thus the name of "golf cap." They are still worn by some popular musicians and other celebrities.



Flat caps have a strong identification with certain classes and occupations in the UK and in the US. Taxicab and bus drivers, Andy Capp, East End dockworkers, and city newsboys, especially in the States, often are portrayed wearing the "cabby hat." When I was a lad, my father's brother had a second job in downtown Chicago, and was occasionally accompanied by me. He got up at 2am to supervise the young newsboys who rolled their papers and filled their pushcarts – usually wearing these caps.

I like that they crumble and store easily and stay on the head well in a strong breeze and when working in the shop. These caps are usually inexpensive and last well. I have picked them up at thrift shops. Be stylish. Try one!


Is there need or interest in a replacement for the Palo Alto event? These are the regular Bay Area large show events especially for British cars:

What's Wrong with our Spark Plugs?

Mike O'Connor reported in a past article that fouled spark plugs are often the cause of poor running in MGs. In his shop, he often 'saved' MG engines that could barely run by simply replacing the plugs. This often happened after the car overheated, flooded or had a rich running condition.

Get the Right Plug

I find there needs to be a lot of enlightenment about spark plugs. I have been supplying spark plugs to restorers and collectors in all phases of the hobby for 20 years and have an extensive library and computer files dedicated to this purpose.

I am also the reference for Champion Spark Plug Co., Autolite and AC Flint customer service referrals for obsolete spark plugs, and I talk to their service personnel on a regular basis.

First, let's define the problem with the new spark plugs. When automobiles became computer controlled, the spark plug did not have to have the bottom of the insulator glazed. New cars have fuel injection, and the computer will not put enough gasoline into the cylinder to flood it. If something happens to this computer control and too much fuel is injected into the cylinder, and the engine floods, this vehicle will not run right until you have replaced the old plugs. What has happened is the gasoline contaminates the spark plugs because they are not glazed on the bottom.

Now, these old engines do not have a computer control, and if your carburetor is running rich or you flood the engine, the same thing happens. The bottom of the insulator where it fires the engine becomes contaminated and becomes junk.


(This is similar to why ceramic mugs must be glazed to hold your coffee. -Ed.)

The solution to this problem is to find spark plugs that were manufactured prior to the time that they quit glazing the bottom of the insulator. (*Prior to 1980.*) In any case, do not sandblast or glass bead them. This removes the glaze and you have a short plug life just as though you had purchased one of the newly manufactured spark plugs.

To get any length of spark plug life in the old engines they must have an insulator that was glazed on the bottom.

Finding new old stock spark plugs to fit our engines may be a problem, of course. In the old days (1930s), English motorists always carried a spare set of plugs because of fouling due to the very poor fuel available. Thus you can readily buy a special bakelite holder with the "MG" logo. I think we have returned to needing to carry a fresh spare set of plugs. They are inexpensive. – Ed.


