Though he was born in Manchester, England, Sir Alistair Cooke is most well known for his reporting from and on America. He explained the struggles, triumphs, oddities, and banalities of America and Americans to the people of his native land through columns in The Times, The Manchester Guardian, and,

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perhaps more notably, in his long running weekly BBC broadcast series Letter from America

As noted as he was for making America intelligible to Britain, he is also widely recognized for having explained America to Americans. A keen observer, Cooke focused on all elements of the diverse American experience – reflecting us back on ourselves with foreign eyes so that we could see ourselves anew.

But for all his British roots, Cooke was neither here nor there. Though he was raised abroad, he ultimately made his home here in America

I mention this because we have a member with a similar migratory path in our little club. Lynette Bailey grew up in England, came to the States in her 20's, and has resided here ever since. 

GoF West at Squaw Valley June 22-26

In 1844 a group of immigrants crossing the Sierra range on their way west encountered a helpful Paiute Indian. He kept repeating the word Tro-kay, and the immigrants assumed he was repeating his name. He guided them through a pass along a river that led into the Sierra; they later named that river after him – the Truckee. What he was saying, it turned out, was "everything is all right" because he was concerned they might think he was hostile.

An area close by Truckee (only 10 miles away) called Squaw Valley became a winter sports area around 1913; but it wasn't until 1946 that it worked its magic on a young man named Alexander Cushing. When Cushing first laid eyes on Squaw Valley there was no road, no bridge, and no houses; but Alex saw potential for growth and success in an industry that, in the US, was relatively untapped. Alex's vision became reality and today Squaw Valley is among the world's best known resorts. Squaw Valley opened to the public on Thanksgiving Day, 1949, with a small lodge, a rope tow, and a chairlift that was billed as the "World's Largest Double Chairlift". Today, Squaw Valley boasts the most advanced lift network in the world with Squaw's world-famous KT-22 ranking first among North American lifts year after year.

Last year the area was rediscovered by the Campbell and Long families when, looking into a place to hold the GoF West in 2009 in the Lake Tahoe area, they came across Squaw Valley. It's a special place, difficult to experience without falling under its spell. It is as if, by its very nature, the valley commands a relationship with those who set foot here. One can travel the world hiking, skiing, climbing, and exploring; Squaw Valley's beauty will still impress.

The 1960 Winter Olympics were held in Squaw Valley. These were the first Games held in the Western United States and the first to be televised. Following the Olympics, improved roads led to further development of recreation resorts in the Sierra Nevada. The completion of I-80 in 1964 made the trip up the hill even easier.

Now another major function will go down in the history of Squaw Valley – GoF West 2009. We will be staying at the Village at Squaw Valley, a set of newly constructed condominiums built in the same area as the original Olympic Village.

There is plenty to see in the area around Squaw Valley. You will have ample time to explore the old buildings in Truckee, and Donner Lake is a short drive away. Our rally will take you on a tour in some of the most scenic valleys in the area as well as to the shore of Lake Tahoe. If you want a longer drive, you can always take a tour along the lake to South Lake Tahoe to gamble. You might even win some money to supplement your 401-K funds.

Mike Campbell and Tim Kane, acting as chairmen of this event, are putting together a wonderful set of activities. 
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

Member Interview

Lynette Bailey is the proud owner of a blue 1977 MGB roadster (cover photo). Though she grew up in England she never owned an MG there. *The Octagon* spoke to Lynette about her family's passion for British cars, revealing unusual inspiration for a name and a wonderful surprise birthday gift.

Your accent suggests that you were not raised in America. Where are you originally from?

I'm from Cambridgeshire, England. I'm actually from a small village that few people know called Crowland, near Peterborough. It's about 90 miles north of London and 45 miles north of Cambridge. I lived in England until I was 22.

What did your family drive growing up?

Minis, and my brother had a minivan when he first started driving. One of my brothers had a Ford Capri, which was made over there. We've always owned pretty much British cars.

And what cars did you own in England?

My first car was a 1969 Mini; and then I had a 1980 Mini. And I also had a'78 Triumph Spitfire. And my brothers have all had British cars.

What British cars did they own?

My brother in South Africa had a TR7, when they were first built. That was like a space age car when it came out. And my other brother owns three MGs right now: a Midget, an MGB GT, and an MGB with the rubber bumpers like mine. They have a real passion for them.

In fact my nephew's initials are MG: Miles Griffith. That's why my brother called him, because he wanted his initials to be MG. He just loves MGs.

That's unbelievable.

Actually, the only time my car gets worked on is when they come over and visit. They go through my car and fix it up for me.

That's very nice of them. What brought you out here?

I've lived out here for 26 years now. I came out really just for adventure, when I was young (laughs). I was a nanny when I first came out here. Then I went to Hawaii for a vacation and met my husband. We lived there for about a year; then we came back to the Bay Area (because he was from Alameda).

Does your husband share your passion for British cars?

Uhhh....not really. They're kind of small for him because he's big - he's

like 6'5" (laughs). He comes in the MG sometimes, but his head is over the top of the windshield. People see him and they just think it's real comical. They figure: "well, bugger".

Has he ever tried wearing driving goggles?

(laughs) No, because I don't go very fast in it. I don't go on long trips.

In light of his predicament with the windshield, how does he feel about the car?

Actually he likes it. He bought the car for me, for my birthday. I always told my husband that I wanted one; and about three years ago I went outside and he'd bought this MGB for me. And the year it came out, it's a '77, that's the first year I could drive. So it was really cool to get that as a gift.

That's very nice of him.

Oh yes. I never thought I would own an MG while I lived in America because I never saw them on the roads anywhere. I always wanted an MG because of my brothers' passion for them, but I never got one in England. I used to tell my husband all the time, "Oh god, I'll never have an MG." And then someone he knew was selling his. Or not really selling it – it just wouldn't fit in the garage anymore so he sold it to my husband for me. And that was that.

Do you know the car's history?

I'm the second owner. The first owner: I know that he had it from brand new. It's got very low miles – about 35,000 miles – because he didn't drive it very much. It basically sat in the garage. Apart from a new roof and tires and stuff, pretty much everything else is how the car came when it was built.

How often do you drive it?

During the summertime I drive it probably every week, one day or two days. In the wintertime, it's pretty much in the garage unless it's warm on a weekend – then I'll take it out.

So it runs well then?

Yeah, it runs pretty well. It's all original, actually. It's even got an 8-track player in it. Everywhere I go, when I fill it up with gas, the kids will come up to me and say, "What kind of car is that?" They haven't even seen an MG before. And then I go, "you don't even know what one of these is" and I bring out an 8-track disc.

How did you come to join the MGOC?

I joined the Club because one year I took my car down to the San Leandro Marina when we had the show in May. The first time I went I'd just got the car and I was driving around and I saw all these MGs. I just said "wow". I pulled in and joined the Club right then.
