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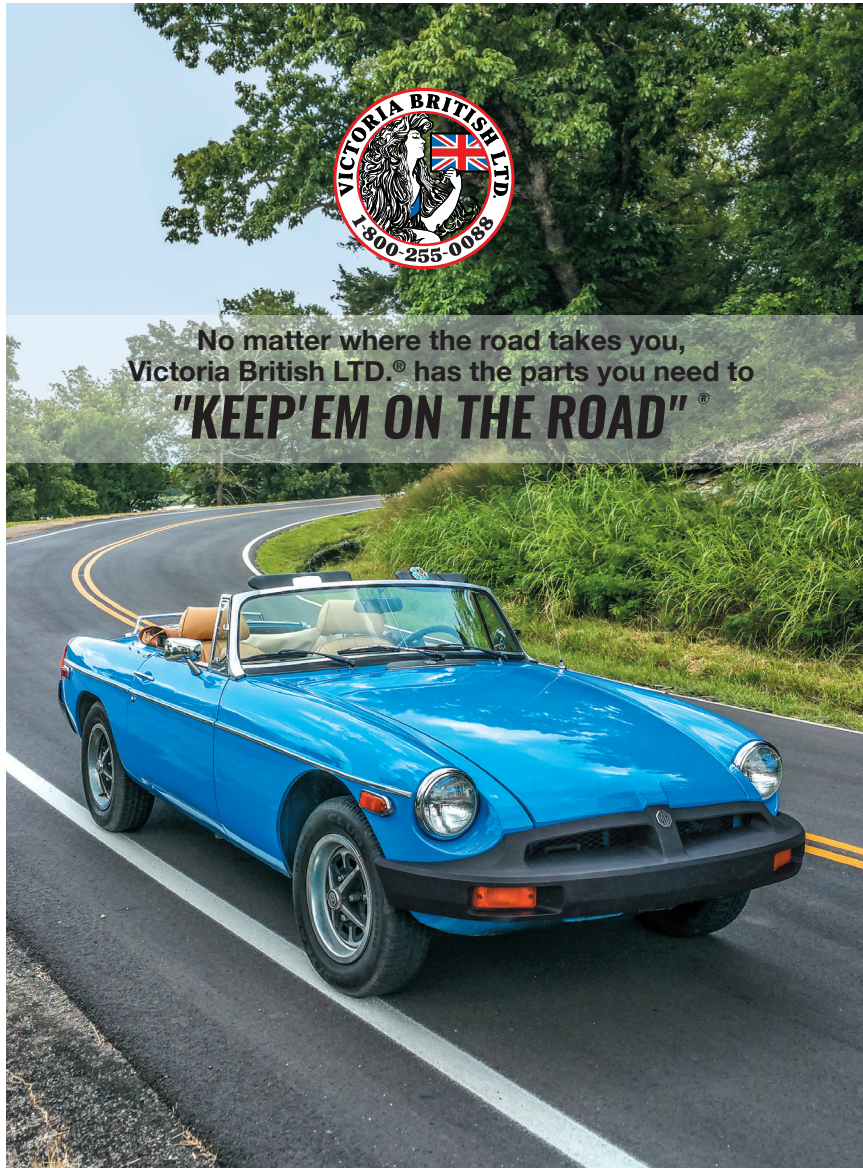


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President's Ponderings...

The \$50 Paint Job?

"That man is the richest whose pleasures are the cheapest" - Thoreau

As I was preparing to sell my MG TD this past year, I did some minor body and paint work on it. I found it frustrating to match the paint and avoid spraying more than I needed. I was intrigued by the reports of a method to paint a car by hand for only \$50.

The interest was sparked by a hobby magazine and on-line blogs reporting on the successful use of hardware store Rustoleum paint on a Corvair. And most enthusiasts have heard of or seen other brush-paint jobs. With the difficulties of obtaining easy home use automotive spray paint and safety equipment, a revival of such a technique is very welcome.

Several successes have been reported on the MG blogs. It was used sometimes for painting inside trunks, under bonnets, and individual parts but also for entire cars. The photos and testimonials provided undeniable proof. An example:

"I used Home Depot Rustoleum for my engine bay - last spring - and it turned out perfect...helped me win 1st place at the Portland, Oregon All British Field Meet!"

The favored technique involves using either the standard Rustoleum or the professional grade version, spread with foam brushes & rollers or a mix of foam and really-good bristle brushes. The paint is diluted and enhanced with products for better leveling and faster drying. There are many recommendations for maximizing the technique. I will only introduce the subject here. Color can be changed by mixing or by using paint tints. Two reds can be mixed, for example. One standard Rustoleum red is very close to MG red and another very good for MG engine red/maroon.

Here is a report by one painter:

Today was coat #1 day for me and the car. It was a learning day for me so my expectations were not very high (mistakes can be sanded out). Various lessons learned:

1. *Despite impatient tendencies, it is good to at least tape the chrome and stuff.*
2. *The Really Cheap paint trays will develop leaks at the corners due to bending.*
3. *Find a rolling table or something to keep the loaded paint tray near you and not on a rounded fender.*
4. *Do not forget to change out of your \$100 LL Bean walking shoes before starting to paint. (See #3.)*
5. *Keep some lacquer thinner around for removing paint from new Sumitomo tires. (See #3.)*
6. *The MEK will evaporate quickly from the paint on a sunny day so keep more around and monitor the viscosity. Add more as needed.*
7. *If you can't spray your paint and you do not really care about winning at Stowe this might not be a bad way to do it. Inside would be a far better place to do the painting (especially under lots of trees). The tree stuff does seem to brush off when it dries a bit.*

NAMGAR GT-42, June 2017

Working with the leaders of NAMGAR, the Paradise British Car Club (Central Coast California) and the MG Owners Club (of Northern California) selected Solvang, California, for the location of NAMGAR's annual Get Together in June, 2017. Both local clubs have a long history with NAMGAR. The Paradise club began as an MGA club. The MGOC incorporates the former NorCal NAMGAR chapter that hosted GT-9 in Tiburon, California. Both clubs include many longtime NAMGAR contributors.

Solvang is located in the historic Santa Ynez Valley that is the central part of Santa Barbara County. This small area – only 20,000 residents – offers so many and diverse features and attractions, that it has been difficult to decide what to promote for the GT. In the end, we just offer you the whole “smorgaasbord.” (Danish for “smorgasbord.”)

Within the Santa Ynez Valley, there are six unique small towns, a thriving wine country, many food specialties, Ronald Reagan's Rancho del Cielo, Michael Jackson's Neverland Ranch, a restored Spanish mission, historic stage stops, multiple mountain ranges and valleys, a casino, Danish windmills and other Danish sites, automotive museums, live theater, hundreds of miles of horseback trails, lakes, and a national forest. It is the home of Split Pea Soup, more than 80 wineries, Ostrichland, Mayberry (1986 movie), and a Botanic Garden. And I can't overlook the antique shops, art galleries, and golf. Early explorers, Franciscan monks, cattle drives, stage coaches, wagon trains and Spanish-American banditos all traveled through this beautiful valley on the El Camino Real. The real-life inspiration for Zorro rode this valley on his powerful steed. One of the small towns looks like an Old West stage set.

The half-timbered buildings of Solvang create a friendly old-world atmosphere that is enjoyed by car show organizers. The Danish bakeries and restaurants are popular with their aebleskiver, frikadeller, medisterpolse and rodkaal. Besides the Elverhoj Museum and the Hans Christian Andersen Museum, there is the Vintage Motorcycle Museum and the Museum of Gasoline Pumps and Petroliana. There are four full-size windmills, as used by the Danish to grind grain. The Old Mission Santa Ines was built in 1804 and renovated in 1904. A performance of the outdoor musical theater is on the agenda with a mix of professional and top aspiring performers. (Pacific Conservatory of Performance Arts's Theaterfest)

Our host motel is located in the midst of this smorgaasbord and is a short walk to the Mission and all the sights and activities in Solvang. The car show will be held at the Mission.

The climate is coastal California, warm, dry and sunny inland and cool at the coast. Santa Barbara is 20 minutes away. The Valley is two hours from Los Angeles and 4 hours from San Francisco. Other areas of the Central Coast are not far, including Hearst Castle, Monterey, Big Sur and Highway 1 along the coast.

Join us for a unique, beautiful and fascinating experience of MGs, Solvang, the Santa Ynez Valley, and the Central Coast of California.

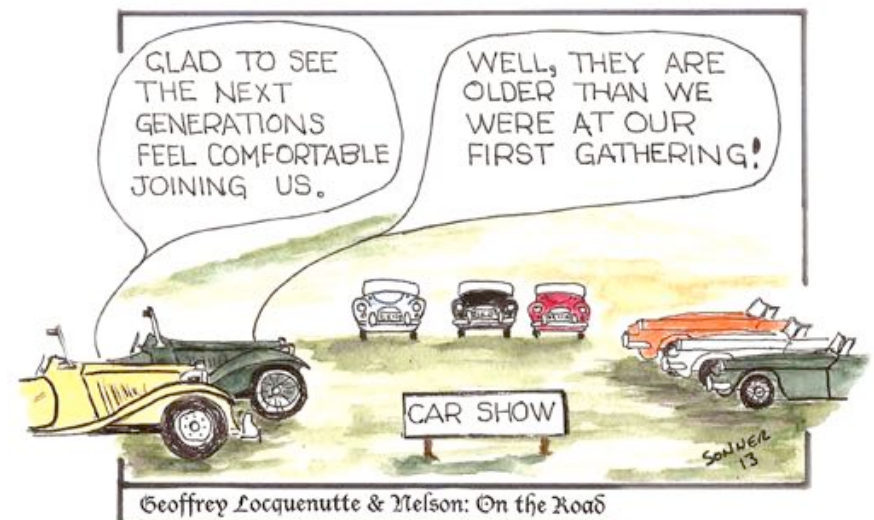

Discover the (Urban) Backroads

When I started driving my 1935 MG PA Midget, I soon found that freeways were not a nice place for it, except early on Sunday mornings. I was living in northern San Jose at that time. I was determined to drive it to events, however, so started looking for non-freeway routes.

We don't normally search for such routes unless it is alternatives when our daily commutes are blocked. I was surprised at how many times I could find a quite acceptable route. It was slower, of course, but I just needed to leave earlier. And I found these routes often interesting and pleasant. Folks would wave and I could even stop to chat, meet dogs and check on the car. They were much easier on me and on the car.

North San Jose was a very good start to catch some of these "g'routes." (Short for good-routes. English is wonderful since we can make up our own words.) Sometimes I would use a short section of freeway to connect between routes. I could get to Morgan Hill, Palo Alto, Livermore, and further places quite easily.

I also used this technique to drive the PA and TD in Illinois (and Missouri, Iowa, Wisconsin and Indiana). I drove the PA 300 miles to Auburn, Indiana, for a GOF, using the minor highways and secondary roads. The corn was new-green and wildflowers covered the roadsides. Some routes I later used for my regular car just because I enjoyed them so much. They are cooler in the summer and offer fun stopping places, like leisurely Bass Lake in Indiana with a beach and snack shop and young kids to climb on the MG.

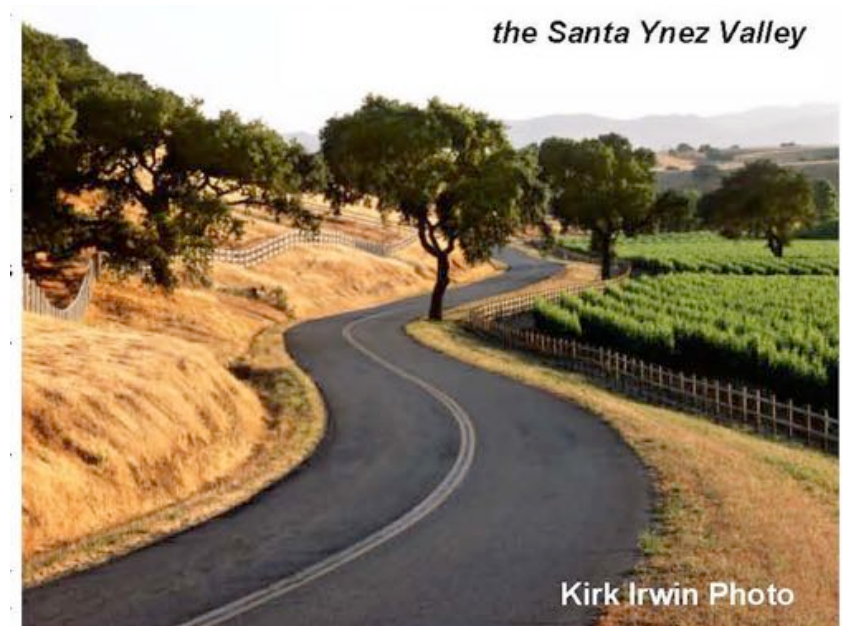
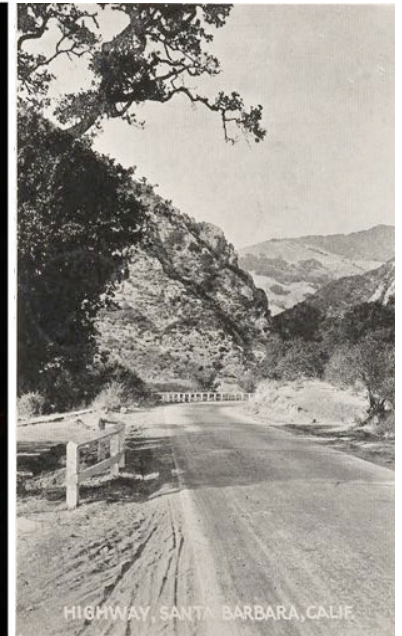
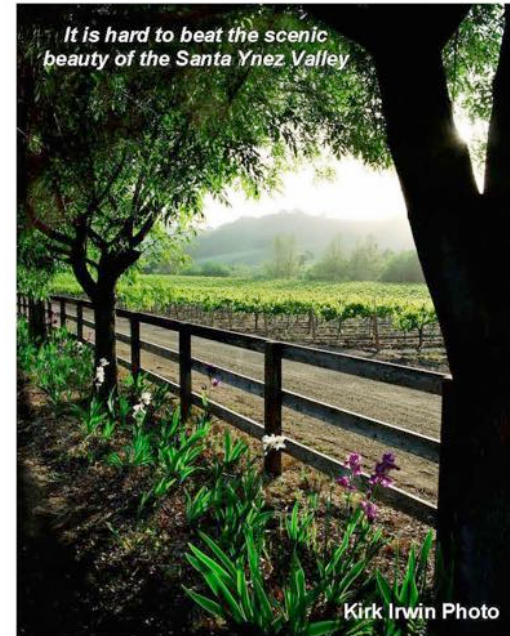
