Wednesday morning dawned anything but warm & sunny for the big event, the ride to Mendocino, and as we all ventured outside before departing, folks could be seen trying to dry off interiors that had gotten wet after being left uncovered the night before. Tonneau covers and tops were going on, folks were pulling jackets and sweaters on though all in all there was an air of anticipation and excitement, notwithstanding the weather. With the cars lined up and after a short, informative driver's meeting, off we went, heading west towards the coast. Minutes of the MGOC Business Meeting, July 14, 2007

The meeting was called to order at 8:03 by President Bob Stine. Also attending were Eric Baker, Nina Barton, Mr. & Mrs. Carl Brown, Guy Gilbert, Ken Gittings, Randy Grossman, Mike Jacobsen, John Pesek, George Steneberg, Bob Trencheny, and David Wright

June Minutes approved after being amended to reflect an email vote to amend the motion to spend up to \$100 for an appreciation present for Dan Shockey. The amendment passed unanimously to include spending up to \$100 for a similar gift for Nancy Shane.

<u>Treasurer's Report:</u> Renewals are still coming in, and our bank balance is at its annual highpoint.

<u>Registrar's Report:</u> 59 renewals are still outstanding. The current membership status is: 221 Regular, 56 Auxiliary, 14 Corresponding, 1 Associate for 292 total members.

Secretary's Report: No report; the Secretary was absent.

Corresponding Secretary's Report: No items.

<u>Regalia Report:</u> David said that he was not going to bring all the regalia, and would skip the smaller items, such as key fobs. He was also unsure of sales times & locations at MG2007. <u>Annual Picnic:</u> August 11 – Bob Stine has reserved our space at Junipero Serra Park. Notes on the Picnic:

- 1. The cost is \$70 for the first 50 people, and \$1.25 per person thereafter the Club pays this fee.
- 2. Parking is \$5 additional, and the members pay this fee. The parking kiosk has often been unstaffed in the past, however.
- 3. Beer & wine are OK to take into the park, but no hard liquor.
- 4. The Club will provide tri-tip, charcoal, a lighter, and ice.
- 5. The Club is not providing drinks this year.

NEW BUSINESS

<u>New Secretary:</u> We need to appoint a new Secretary to fill the remainder of Dan's term. There were no volunteers, so we are requesting that folks consider it. Meanwhile, Mike Jacobsen volunteered to record the minutes.

<u>Tri-tip BBQ</u>: A motion was passed to allow purchase of tri-tip by the Club for the Annual Picnic, with a budget of up to \$200. This would be to commemorate our 50th anniversary. <u>Last All-British Plaque</u>: A motion was made to create a special dash plaque for the last All-British Meet in Palo Alto. One suggestion was to put a Chevy El Camino on the plaque. The plaque would have a single imprint color and be 1x3 inches, similar to the MGs by the Bay plaques. The plaques would be for MGOC members first, and then other MG owners at the show could purchase them if there were any remaining plaques. The motion passed, with an authorization to spend up to \$50.

Association of California Car Clubs: We received a request to join the ACCC, a group that lobbies and monitors legislation in Sacramento that would have an impact on the old car hobby. There was no motion to join the ACCC due to the perceived high cost of membership for the Club, up to \$500 a year.



MG 2007 Tech Sessions Review

Tech sessions are a vital part of MG events and the sessions at MG2007 were no different. A great selection of material, both technical and historical, was presented by significant figures in the ongoing history of MG.

On Tuesday and Thursday, John Twist of University Motors held his famous rolling tech sessions. At a rolling tech session you drive up your car, he listens and looks and discovers what work needs to be done to fix or improve your car. All I can say about this event was that it was a huge hit and it was also just the right amount of time since everyone that wanted to roll their car in had a chance.

On Wednesday afternoon we had Mike Singleton of Sportscars Ltd., a highly regarded shop in Sacramento, give a presentation on ignition systems that provided insight that only a pro could provide.

Later that afternoon we had Ken Smith, who needs no introduction, give us a slide show *Aspects of Abingdon* that was highly entertaining and informative. We learned that these were truly hand built cars, not assembled by a machine. They were pushed by hand along an assembly line by craftsman. It was a real treat to see part of what makes the MG a special car.

On Wednesday evening we had Joe Huffaker, Sr. and Jr. as well as Steve Lilves who worked at Huffaker Engineering during MG's racing heyday. In case you may have not heard of them, they built all the Sebring MG race cars in the 1960s and also built the liquid suspension MG that raced at Indy. They shared their thoughts and insight in building and racing MGs in the 1960s and 1970s. One interesting note, one of the rubber bumper Bs they built in the 1970s, number 11, got the fastest lap record at Road Atlanta for Class E production cars in 1977, a record they held for twenty years! The Huffakers donated three special items for our silent auction: a framed autographed poster of the Road Atlanta MGB., an autographed picture of the liquid Suspension MG, and an autographed tuning guide by Joe Huffaker from the 1970s.

On Thursday Paul Lewis, a former British Leyland Salesman, shared his insights and memories selling MGs in the late 1970s. He shared some interesting trivia such as they considered re-badging the TR-7 as an MG to help sell out the Triumph inventory. Of course that never happened, but he showed his sales figures which reconfirmed the fact that MG was far more popular, almost outselling Triumph 2 to 1.

Paul was followed by a very special guest, Brian Woodhams, Director of the MG Car Club of England. In many ways he really helped make this event. It was a real privilege for us to have him here and connect with our roots, so to speak. He shared with us how MGCC of England has evolved and is gearing up for a bright future. Their magazine *Safety Fast* has been updated and recently has gone from 40 to 100 pages. So, if you want to know what's happening the MG world, you need to join the MG Car Club of England as well. Also, his update about MG in China was very informative and positive.

I would say some of the common themes of all of our tech sessions were that all the speakers were lively, very entertaining and informative, and all the sessions were very well attended.
