

My first MG was a 1961 MGA bought new when I was 16 years old. I later built my first MGB-V8 in 1972 using a 215 Buick, Muncie 4 speed and XKE rear end assy. I am personal friends with Ron and Malcolm Gammons, which allowed me to build a works replica MGB vintage racer that fooled everyone and got me into the Monterey Historics. I was involved with getting the MGB body shell back into production at Heritage. I built (along with 3 guys from Brown & Gammons) the first body shell into a running car at the NEC May 1988. Car is known as "TAXI." I built an MGB driven by Sterling Moss and Jean Lindamood in the Pirelli Classic Marathon.

Over the years the show has moved around to various locations but it is remained basically the same and supported by people like you who are passionate about their cars and proud to



Member Notes

From Mike Jacobsen, on driving home from the GOF:

I, not wanting to miss any donuts, left about a quarter after nine and got home at the same time in the evening. The car ran fine, though hot since it was over 100°F in the Valley. The only problem was in the afternoon near Corning, CA when the engine began to stumble as if it was out of gas. I knew that wasn't right, since the tank was still half full, but when I slowed down I could hear the fuel pump ticking as if the tank was about empty. Checking the lines & carbs didn't show any problems so I decided it was vapor lock. Sure enough, after sitting with the hood up for about ten minutes, the car was fine. I went slower after that (we'd been doing 75~80 on I-5) and it was OK.

From Andy Preston, on returning from Oregon:

Engine Info from Carl Brown:

It's probably more than a valve problem. When the #4 exhaust valve failed the first time I took the head off for Dave Pelton to do a full valve job on it. I put the head back on but within a few months the valve failed again. I took it back to Dave for a look and we just figured maybe a bad valve, something with the valve seat or some such thing and he replaced the valve again. This time after getting the head back on he did the test where you check how the rings are holding pressure in the cylinder and found that #4 rings were a bit weak. The other cylinders are within tolerance. A few months later the valve burned again leading me to think that the rings need to be looked at as well.

I'll get some grease under my nails one day and go

after it.






