President's Ponderings...

If You Could Make One Change

I want to thank everyone who took the time to respond to our recent Membership Survey. Frankly, I am stunned and pleased by the numbers. When the board undertook this exercise, we expected to get perhaps 25, maybe 50, or, on the really optimistic side, 70 responses. We were flabbergasted to receive responses from nearly 50% of the membership. The board and I and thank all of the 107 members who saw fit to take a few minutes of their time to provide us their input.

Needless to say all of your responses must be evaluated, analyzed, and reported back to you, the members. An ad hoc committee is already at work doing exactly that. You will see those results in coming months, along with recommendations the committee makes based on your answers. As you might imagine, there is a mountain of raw data that needs to be compiled into meaningful and readily understandable results. We are looking to see if there are any clear over-riding sentiments that suggest action items and/or changes to reflect the overall goals and activity interests of the club membership.

I personally have seen little of the raw data, since that is the committee's job (thank goodness). I did, however, review the dozens of responses to the rather simple question: *If you could make one change in the MGOC, what would it be?*

I looked at each response and wondered to myself, "What is that person asking for and how can the MGOC try to fulfill that request?" Obviously the committee will flesh out the details; my review was but a mere snapshot of the answers to a single question. Moreover, that snapshot is only how I focused and framed the subjects.

But I think the responses to this survey question alone might best summarize your thoughts and ideas. I doubt that you will be surprised that these responses brought a multitude of comments. However, some recurring themes, general items that convey many of the same feelings and views, became apparent. Interestingly, I found I was able to distill all of the comments, thoughts, and ideas down to six broad themes:

1. <u>Go British</u>: Promote interest in British sports cars, introduce a new generation of younger folks to MGs, and get fresh ideas from new and younger members.

Okay, get younger folks involved. I'm sure we'll need to pry them out of their BMWs, Hondas, or whatever else is the hottest set of wheels these days.

2. <u>Geographic Challenges</u>: Consider local chapters, encourage local drives, promote unofficial events. As one put it, "Face it, in our area we have three markets: North, South, and East Bay." Others noted they would never consider driving from Petaluma to Morgan Hill, or from San Jose to Sonoma, for an event.

Ah, our geographic challenge... not to mention trucks, traffic, and tolls.

3. Easy to Attend: Increase member participation and event attendance. Whenever possible, do not charge members for attending events.

Not charging members is an interesting idea. Trust me, we've tried to increase participation. Perhaps your other survey answers will provide some ideas on how to do that.

4. <u>Technology</u>: Modernize the Club, improve the Web site, invest in technology, and provide more local internet interaction between members through the Web site.

This seems to be a worthwhile and achievable goal.

5. <u>Interclub Events</u>: Join with other car clubs for rides and events, have more weekend and overnight trips, and arrange more mid-week drives.

The love of driving seems to be alive and well here in the MGOC.

6. <u>Mechanics</u>: MGs are sports cars. Have more performance oriented events, racing and track time, provide better assistance and prices for obtaining parts, provide more information and help with restorations.

Perhaps this is a niche that has been overlooked in the past.

All are wonderful ideas, and many have been floated by me and others in the past. I have written previous ponderings inviting local members to connect to arrange informal or mid-week rides and get-togethers. I also offered Club resources and assistance to promote those. Likewise, I suggested regional chapters under the MGOC umbrella.

We would love to update and improve the Web site, and have actively advertised for a new webmaster. We hope to find the webmaster within the club, rather than outside. An outside webmaster would be professional but would need to be paid, and we try to be mindful of the fact that the MGOC is a volunteer organization.

Therein lies the rub, and is what I consider to be a most important question that was not included in the survey:

Are YOU willing to volunteer your time and energy to help implement your ideas? Well, are you?

The same 10 or 15 members seem to have done all of the planning over the years. We would love to have some fresh and enthusiastic volunteers to help implement your ideas and make the Club what you want it to be. You need to participate to make that happen. Offering your ideas is helpful, but not if it falls to the same few to try to implement them. Volunteer to lead a ride, arrange informal member get-togethers, help with event planning, the Annual Dinner, a summer picnic. Whatever it is, get involved.

I assure you that we look forward to continuing to improve our club with your help. Thanks again to all of you for taking the time and effort to respond to our survey!

<u>Corresponding Secretary's Report</u>: George gets plenty of junk mail addressed to several previous MGOC officers.

<u>Regalia</u>: David Wright reported there were no regalia sales at the Annual Dinner.

The Octagon: Ken Gittings commented that Jeremy did a great job of photo correcting pictures Ken submitted for publication.

Web Site: Nothing to report.

Past Events

Annual Planning Meeting: Discussions at the meeting included the Wine Country Tour, the St Patrick's Day Tour, and a second Waves to Wine to Wings Tour. We have confirmed leaders for all three tours and dates will be in the calendar. The WWW Tour will have a new name and new destinations. Mike Jacobson is still working with John Bertolotti to arrange a date for a tour of John's car collection. Lee & Valerie Sheldon offered to provide information for a San Francisco Tour. Old Business

MGOC Non-profit Status Filing: In January Mike submitted paperwork to the California Franchise Tax Board to justify our non-profit status. Mike has not heard back from the FTB.

Membership Survey: The survey is complete. Randy Grossman presented several interesting facts: 109 members responded to the 211 surveys sent. This is an extremely high response rate and indicates the survey results are very reliable. A few statistics: members average age is 60.6 years, members own an average 1.8 MGs, average membership is 8.1 years, average years of MG ownership is 17.1 years, 33% of MGOC members drive their MG year round, 82% of members read *The Octagon* from cover-to-cover. And the average membership satisfaction with the Club is 85%!

Randy Grossman and a group of club officers will review the survey results after the remainder of the data is compiled.

<u>NAMGAR West 2009</u>: NAMGAR asked for a copy of the hotel contract and a financial accounting of the NAMGAR West 2009 event. NAMGAR agreed to split the losses from the event with the MGOC.

New Business

At-Large Board Members: Craig Kuenzinger and David Wright agreed to be at-large members of the MGOC board. Craig and David served in the same capacity last year.
