From the Editor...

Many's the time I've been mistaken/ And many times confused/ Yes, and I've often felt forsaken/ And certainly misused/ Oh, but I'm all right, I'm all right/ I'm just weary to my bones – American Tune by Paul Simon

I find myself pondering the nature of community. What does it mean to say a group of people are a community? Is a community simply any group of people who share a common interest? And what does it mean to call yourself a member of a community? Is it enough to merely share that common interest?

I humbly suggest that shared interest alone is insufficient for a vital community. Note the key phrase in that sentence: *a vital community*.

Perhaps a group of people with a shared interest who do nothing can be called a community. But what sort of community would that be?

A vital community requires a shared interest and the desire to do something with that interest. And even that desire is not sufficient for a vital community. Something more is required: *action*.

A vital community exists only if someone acts on their desire. A vital community, a true community, only takes shape if a few people care enough to do something.

Perhaps a community starts with a handful of like minded British car enthusiasts who start to gather and plan events. Maybe the community grows and continues as other enthusiasts join and participate. Eventually, fifty years on, that community might have almost 300 dues-paying members across the Bay Area, well-attended monthly events, and a large annual show. But the vitality of the community is measured not in the number of members or events, but in the number of people willing to give of themselves to create, continue, and serve the community.

My fellow members, we do in fact have a community. We have a large number of people who want to participate in events. We have many people who care enough to suggest ways to make things better. Unfortunately, we do not have many people who are willing to work to make it all happen.

A great many people, caring and interested MGOC members, have come to rely on a small leadership group. The trouble is that our core group has been at it a long time and isn't receiving much help.

I can't speak for anyone else, but I can tell you that I am wearying under the strain – and I've only been at it a few years. Some of our leaders have been part of the core group for well over a decade. And while I can't say whether they too are weary; I can confidently say that many of them are looking for help (and perhaps a bit of a break).

A vital community needs people with a shared interest, with a desire to participate, and at least a few people who are willing to get involved and lead. The more leaders, the more vital the community.

With more leaders come more creative ideas. The more leaders, the better the necessary tasks can be distributed. When you have more leaders, you can focus on the details of making events better, instead of scrambling just to find a tour leader. Equally importantly, when you have more leaders there's far less risk of burnout.

I know that we are a community of interesting, passionate, caring, and competent individuals; the only question is whether we care enough to contribute. I can only presume that you enjoy being a member, and that you want our community to thrive. So I ask, will you take a small step towards strengthening our community? Will you lead a tour, or host a tech session, or write an article? A small step is all it takes.

This year we are heading for the sun at the Mt. Bachelor Village Resort. Mount Bachelor, formerly named Bachelor Butte, is a strato-volcano atop a shield volcano in the Cascade Volcanic Arc and the Cascade Range of Central Oregon. The Mount Bachelor ski area has operated on the mountain since 1958. Mount Bachelor ski area operates a chairlift during the summer as well as during the ski season. Mount Bachelor is so called because it “stands apart” from the Three Sisters, a group of three volcanic mountains that are northwest of Mount Bachelor. In early days Bachelor Butte was frequently called “Brother Jonathan”.

Standard Rendezvous events include the Funkhana (a test of driving skill combined with whimsical tasks), a gimmick rally (you answer questions while driving the route), a driving tour of the countryside, and, of course, a car show (vote for your favorite in each class). 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The Airport to Africa Run

Saturday, August 14

Sonoma

Wayne Veatch invites the MGOC and the SSTS to join him for a visit to the Schellville Antique Aerodrome, also known as the [Sonoma Valley Airport](#) (“The Home of the Taildraggers”), followed by caravan run to historic [Foster’s Bighorn](#) restaurant and bar in old town Rio Vista. We’ll be there for the airport’s monthly Open House, with many antique airplanes on display and the opportunity for “hangar talk” with their owners. Foster’s Bighorn features an astounding collection of North American and African wildlife trophies, collected by hunter and taxidermist Bill Foster in the 1930s and ‘40s.



We will meet at the Sonoma Cheese Factory, on the north side of the town square, at 9:00 am. If you wish, you may also meet us at the airport, about one mile south of the intersection of highways 121 and 116, at 9:45 am. We will view airplanes, while airport locals and visitors view our cars, until about 11:30 am; then we’ll caravan to Rio Vista.

It’s about an hour and 45 minute drive to Foster’s Bighorn (143 Main Street, Rio Vista) via Highway 12, Cordelia, and back roads. Lunch will commence about 1:30 pm. We have a choice of Chicken Caesar Salad (veggie option available), Chicken Breast Sandwich (with Swiss cheese and bacon - yum!), Half Order of Ribs or Bison Burger, each with a soft drink, for a fixed price of \$17.50 (including tax and tip - cash only). They have a full bar with good draft beers.

Stay in Rio Vista as long as you wish, then choose your own route home. Some of us will return to the East Bay and San Francisco by the most expedient route: 160 to 4 to 242 to 24. Others will return via Kirker Pass from 4 to Walnut Creek, which will be more interesting, avoid some freeway travel, and take about 20 minutes longer.

Regalia: David Wright sold a pennant at the meeting.

The Octagon: Running a little late this month. It should be out any day now.

MGs by the Bay: About 75 cars were in the show. Show attendance was way up this year. Lots of people saw the show advertised in the local ANG papers. One minor complaint was that the MGB GTs were too spread out on the field. Craig estimates there were 14 GTs this year. This problem is partly the result of cars that register the day of the show.
