Daffodil Hill Day Tour

Saturday, March 29



We're meeting up with our friends in the Sorry Safari Touring Society for a day tour to Daffodil Hill in Amador County. Along the way, there will be quizzes, prizes, and lunch at the St. George Hotel. Come join us as we drive the scenic California backroads to the heart of the Mother Lode for a spectacular display of daffodils.

Each spring Daffodil Hill explodes with thousands of blooms, attracting visitors from around the world. Situated in Northern California's Amador County, Daffodil Hill is a four acre farm owned by the McLaughlin family since 1887. The farm began, in the early days of the gold rush, as a 36-acre ranch and toll road for travelers and teamsters hauling timber. In 1887, after coming west from New York and Ohio, wagon pioneer Arthur McLaughlin and his wife, Elizabeth "Lizzie" van Vorst-McLaughlin, settled at the ranch.

The ranch was purchased from an old Dutchman, Pete Denzer, who had planted daffodils from his native land. These yellow blooms were Lizzie's most prized possession, and she divided and replanted the bulbs each year to increase the size of their garden. The bulbs have since been lovingly nurtured by successive generations of the McLaughlin family.

Today, much of the landscape around the old homestead is covered with more than 300 named varieties of daffodils. For the last twenty years, the McLaughlins have continued to plant up to 6,000 new bulbs a year. It is estimated that today, Daffodil Hill is carpeted with over 300,000 bulbs.

A Tale of Two Cultures

Auto Dreams from England and America

My Ride Contributed by MGOC Member Jim Lucas

Jim Lucas, 56, is a Bay Area native who lives in Santa Cruz, where the surfing is good.

My earliest recollection as a toddler was sitting in my aunt's backyard in Atherton, where my uncle had bought her a 1948 Chrysler Town & Country woody runabout convertible in hopes of teaching her how to drive. My next car memory was my folks' 1958 Sunbeam Rapier, which was also a convertible.

Those late 1950s days in pre-Silicon Valley Palo Alto provided a hotbed of British car enthusiasts, and our next door neighbor drove a Jaguar XK 150. The water level of Palo Alto went up three feet due to all the drooling the neighbors did when the XK drove by! I recall our car being the only Sunbeam, but there were a bunch of Hillmans, and we always flashed our lights at each other when passing on the road.

In 1963, my dad unexpectedly came home with an MG Midget. With my dad driving, Mom in the passenger seat, and me holding on for dear life in the back compartment, we regularly went over the hill on Highway 17 to Santa Cruz and Carmel. To this day, that's still my favorite car that my dad owned. In 1971, he bought a Ford Capri, which was the closest he'd come to owning another British car. I got my SCCA Novice racing license in 1972 and tooled around SCCA tracks doing various races in a Triumph TR4A.

After a pretty bad shunt on turn 11 at Sears Point Raceway in 1973, I put my energies into surfing. As such, my vehicles reflected that. In 1991, on my 40th birthday, my lovely wife got me a 1951 Ford Country Squire woody wagon and I had my first classic American car. But my fondness for British cars never diminished. Thirteen years later I came home with a 1979 MGB, much the same as my dad had done 30-plus years earlier.

My tale of two cultures goes to my love of anything British, harking back to that infamous February evening in 1964 when four "mop tops" from Liverpool invaded the Colonies and my life was changed forever. I took up the guitar and rattled about in several South Bay bands (The Union Jacks, Rough Edge, Plymouth Rock, the Other Side, etc.) throughout the mid-to-late '60s. But something about a miniature British vehicle made me feel somewhat akin to James Bond and (hush) a fifth Beatle!

Alas, my other hobby of surfing was in stark opposition to anything small. It, too, started in 1964 with my older brother Cy taking me out to Inside Pleasure Point in Santa Cruz. A surfboard was measuring in at more than nine feet in length and the lifestyle of going on safari seeking the

perfect wave needed something to keep the board in, as well as a place to sleep. As I got older and graduated from college, work commitments also dictated my vehicle choices.

My wife got me thinking outside the box when she surprised me with the Woody. I loved driving the TR4 during my SCCA racing days, but felt I needed something that wouldn't wrap me around a telephone pole if a Beatles song came on the radio. After much searching and an inordinate amount of test drives, British car nirvana came in the shape of a British racing green '79 MGB. My wife was in London doing training for a group of students she would be taking to Europe the following summer, so the MGB found a nice place in the garage next to the Woody.

My wife returned and four days later, opened the door into the garage, and inquired about little sports car in our garage. I tried the line I had used in acquiring a mass of surfboards (close to 100 now) "Uh, babe, you know I told you about that. I got that right before you left for London. Don't you remember?" It took two solid months of painstaking apologies, bringing her the morning paper with a cup of coffee on a daily basis, and cleaning up the recycled dog food in the backyard.

Finally, after an afternoon zipping about the back roads around Moss Landing, she gave me a smile and said she liked HER car. While she can't drive a stick, she is one of the best navigators in the Western Hemisphere. And I'm actually starting to get into the habit of bringing her the morning paper and a cup of coffee every morning now. I do my dawn patrols in the Woody when I go surfing and then do an afternoon jaunt around the hills behind Santa Cruz in a Walter Mitty-esque version of Stirling Moss charging at Monaco. I have the best of both worlds – which truly is "California Dreamin'!"

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Second Twice For Midget at SCCA Runoffs

Brian Linn is the first racer to enter a single race car in two classes at the Sports Car Club of America's annual National Championship Runoffs and finish second both times. Both drives were outstanding efforts against defending National Champions. Brian brought a well-prepared 1972 MG Midget with different displacement engines for two classes, and finished second in both to current Runoffs champions - Jesse Prather in F Production (FP) and Tom Feller in H Production (HP).

"Both races were tough," said Linn, of Hermosa Beach, California. "My car in F Production trim with a 1275cc. engine had better handling than the competition but was down on power compared to the 1600cc Miata of Prather. In H Production with a 1098cc. engine, it had seemed slightly more powerful than the competition but the handling wasn't quite there. The schedule of races worked, too, so that my H Production race was on Friday and my F Production race was Sunday. That gave us time to make sure every nut was tightened after the engine swap, instead of just hoping we remembered all of them like we have to do during the regular season."

After starting from the pole in FP, Jesse Prather traded the lead numerous times with Brian Linn's Midget before pulling away at the finish.

Starting from pole in a Triumph Spitfire, Tom Feller was in a good position to capture his fourth-consecutive HP title, but Brain Linn's MG Midget gave Feller the battle of a lifetime. As a light sprinkle fell on Heartland Park Topeka, the pair exchanged the lead with every lap. The moment of truth arrived on the final lap when Feller looked to the inside of Linn entering Turn Ten. One driver sped to the finish to become the HP National Champion, the other did some creative landscaping in the grass.

Linn's father, Jim Linn, started racing a Bugeye Sprite in the late 60's. After trips to the Runoffs in '79 and '80, Brian began dreaming of winning his own championship. His first racing experience came in 1985 when his mother bought him entry in an SCCA Drivers School as a high school graduation present.

MGs are still raced regularly in top-flight SCCA competition. Midgets (and Sprites) are the most competitive in their classes, though MGBs compete for race wins as well. Kent Prather's 9-time national champion MGA started third this year in class FP (behind his son and Linn's Midget) but didn't get the breaks and settled for 9th. Three MGBs started in class EP. In class HP, 15 of the 26 starters were in Midgets and Sprites.

Secretary's Report: Absent.

<u>Corresponding Secretary's Report</u>: The NAMGBR chapter renewal form was received, and George will fill it out and return it. Also received was a SCCA Rallye Group notice of an event in April. The rallyemaster was known to some of those present who expected the rallye to be a good one.
